Suppliers don't always recognize the client and may be unwilling to provide documentation



Implementing an escalation path will help mitigate risk.



Declaration / Certificate of Conformity without any supporting documentation, regardless of the item's complexity Receiving a DoC restricts your ability to easily mitigate risk for high-risk components and materials.








Intertek often receives Bill of Materials with information missing such as:
